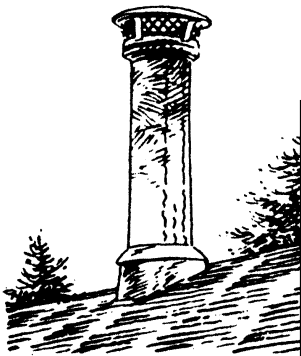

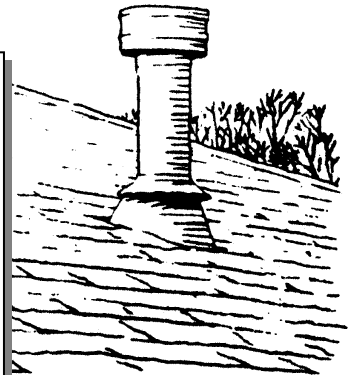
Are you sure that what you see coming from your neighbor's chimney is wood smoke?



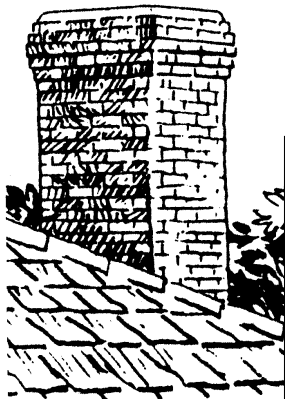
Often on cold days, the harmless exhaust from natural gas furnaces or fireplaces can be mistaken for smoke. The sketches below can help you to determine whether the stack on your neighbor's house is a chimney for a fireplace or wood stove or just an exhaust vent for a natural gas appliance.



Wood stove or fireplace chimneys are generally larger than natural gas vents, and they are frequently darkened by the soot from the smoke. They also usually have some sort of screen or grate around or near the top to capture sparks.



Natural gas vents on roof tops are usually narrower than chimneys for wood-burning devices and don't have screens or grates. A natural gas steam plume generally disperses faster than smoke.



Although brick chimneys are usually associated with fireplaces and wood stoves, they can also be used for natural gas vents, especially in older homes. The top of either type of chimney may be visible above the brick.
